From Exile to Easter

The past year has been a surreal experience for everyone. That is especially true for faith communities like St. Mary of the Harbor who out of necessity, have had to adapt to COVID mitigation restrictions involving group gatherings. The challenge for us has been to come up with innovative ways to retain a sense of communion without being together in person.

With vaccination efforts well under way in Massachusetts and with a limited rolling back of restrictions, we will soon return to in person Sunday worship services, albeit with limits on the number of attendees, at least for the time being.

While this is welcome news, we should not look at the past year simply as a deadly aberration. To do so would

Treasurer's Report



For the first quarter ending March 31, 2021 we saw a decrease in pledge and plate revenue of \$6,970 compared to the previous year resulting in a deficit. Total operating expenses dropped as well by \$1,895.

Last year, the church received a \$28,852 Payroll Protection Act loan from the federal government to help pay salaries, benefits and other operating expenses. This loan was critical to the church's cash flow in 2020 and the amount was carried as a liability on the church's books until recently when we received notification that the loan has been forgiven. Additional good news arrived shortly afterward that St. Mary's was approved for a second PPP loan to help fund the church's recurring operating expenses in 2021.

While the funds from the PPP loan provide a limited cushion for a while, the church depends on pledge bequests still needs to

squander an opportunity to identify what we have learned as a congregation and how we might apply the lessons we have learned going forward.

In a sense, we are at a point not unlike what the disciples experienced following Jesus' death. Traumatized by events, the lure to return to the familiarity of their past lives was strong. Scripture says that Peter and his companions went back to fishing. And that would have been the end of the story except for one thing: Easter.

Jesus' resurrection challenged his disciples to look at life anew. As we emerge from COVID exile, my hope is that we will do the same as a congregation. The question is, are we willing to expand our vision of the future and refocus our efforts on connecting rather than simply regathering.



Regathering Team Update

St. Mary's Regathering Team met to discuss the future of in person worship services. Given the high vaccination rates on the Outer Cape, the consensus was that people now feel safe enough to attend Sunday worship services indoors again, while following COVID safety protocols established last year by the team in consultation with the diocesan office.

The church's two annual fundraisers and the future use of the parish hall by local community groups was also discussed. While no decisions were made, it was agreed that the chair persons of the Annual Summer Fair and the Art & Spirit Event would need to consider if and how the fundraisers could take place safely, using the Regathering Team as an advisory resource.


